Every Community Needs A FCL Club

With this in mind and with the desire to organize a new club, assess the commitment of a club, area leaders and yourself to this important project. Given the assurance of support, confirm intention to County FCL Officers and/or County FCL Advisor.

As "Rome was not built in a day," neither is a FCL club. In addition to time, organizing a FCL club requires the four "Ps".

- 1. Planning
- 2. Preparation
- 3. Patience
- 4. Persistence

Following are the basic steps.

Step One: Identify a community or geographic area that has defined boundaries:

- That you know has a particular issue to be addressed.
- Where you know a leader of the community.
- Where you want to help FCL grow.

Step Two: Make contact in the community with:

- Someone you know.
- Someone another FCL knows.
- An acknowledged leader in the community.
- Advertisement via mass media, flyers, etc.

Step Three: Develop a list of key individuals provided by the initial contact:

- Four to six people, minimum.
- Visit and explain FCL.
- Set initial meeting (within 10 days).
- Ask each individual to bring others.

Step Four: Plan the organizational meeting:

- Prepare and send letters of invitation to the contact list.
- Arrange for 2-3 FCL members to provide testimonials and answer questions at the meeting.
- Assemble materials for the meeting —brochures, constitution, FCL Newsletter, news clippings, individual member handbooks, etc.
